Dashboards Simplify Performance Reporting

First in a series of articles on Performance Management written by Stevan Gorcester and Rhonda Reinke. Stevan Gorcester was a speaker at the national conference in Phoenix.

Successful performance management requires that meaningful, current, and easily interpreted data are put in the hands of decision makers. If you then take that data and consider it, debate it, and heed it in making decisions, you are managing with data. If that happens in most decision making, your organization is well on its way to being a performance-managed agency.

Successful performance management demands effective performance reporting. Fortunately, technology has simplified the effort of communicating quality data to leaders and managers. Software dashboards in particular offer elegant simplicity to the otherwise difficult task of reporting performance for quick interpretation by both the numbers people and the ideas people. The use of dashboards to display decision-

critical data has grown rapidly in the private sector and is catching on with public agencies.

Public sector data efforts are being driven in part by performance mandates from elected officials and administrators. Washington Governor Christine Gregoire adopted the government management, accountability, and performance (GMAP) directive for all state executive branch

agencies soon after her election in 2004. GMAP follows the model of Baltimore's Citistat Program and tackles the difficult task of applying common performance

principles across the vast organization that makes up state government. In other words, Washington state agencies must not merely report data, they must use the performance feedback provided by the data to direct improvements.

The Washington State Transportation Improvement Board (TIB) im-

plemented its performance

dashboard in 2003 and followed the GMAP directive in earnest after its adoption in 2004. Performance

display decision-critical



management became a key tool in driving the board's grant programs

after years of overprogramming.

An internal performance dashboard was a natural extension of that focus because dashboards facilitate easy access to and in-

terpretation of data and provide instantly updated information for management decision making. The TIB's dashboard delivered the highlevel performance reporting that successful performance managers need.

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
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Community Service Special Event

AGA & Weller Elementary School

When the Springfield School District closed Shady Dell Elementary school in 2006, all of those



students were transferred to Weller Elementary School. That put the school at capacity and caused a few problems.

On Thursday, November 1, 2007 Weller Elementary opened a new addition. Weller Elementary is one of 25 district schools being renovated through a \$96.5 million bond initiative approved by voters in April last year.

In addition to construction, a lot of preparation was necessary before the ribbon-cutting event last Thursday. Justin Hill, our chapter Membership Director, describes AGA's land-scaping project for Weller Elementary:

"Jerry and I had a blast working with two classes from Weller Elementary. We went there thinking that we were just going to put the stuff in ourselves. However, we were overwhelmed with help from the students! It was a tremendous learning experience for them; now they can say "we did this!" The children planted approximately 15 plants, put up a bird bath, and two poles on which to hang bird feeders and houses (the students will be making those in future class projects). Even the principal came out and "did a little digging."

The children got experience planting, watering, feeding, mulching, pruning, and landscaping. They even got to use my power drill and glue gun. I was scared a few times when the children would swing my large pick axe so closely to a class mate. Amazingly, no children were harmed during the whole event. It was a wonderful experience.

All of the supplies for the project were purchased by

AGA. I also donated a worm factory (a vermicomposting bin). Worms can turn fruit and vegetable scraps into rich organic compost in a matter of days. My children loved our "pet worms." I am excited for the students to have the opportunity to use it.



I attended the ribbon cut-

ting ceremony for the entire school on November 1st. They are all proud of their new place, and excited about the future. Thanks to Jerry for cultivating that relationship, and giving AGA the opportunity to create a special experience for the children."

Accounting, Finance Salaries on the Rise

Starting salaries for accounting and finance professionals are expected to increase an average of 4.3 percent in 2008, according to the annual salary guide by Robert Half International. The pay increases stem from business expansion and growing workloads-direct results of

compliance requirements mandated by Sarbanes-Oxley--combined with staffing shortages. Not surprisingly, experienced candidates have greater leverage in negotiating compensation, and salaries for the most in-demand specialties are rising faster than the national aver-

age. Public accountants, financial analysts and internal auditors are projected to see the largest gains, according to the survey.
