## March 8, 2017 Luncheon Presentation

## Uniform Guidance: Doing Things Differently

Our chapter hosted a two-hour webinar presented by representatives from the Federal Government (Jeffrey Johnson, Associate Deputy Assistant Secretary for Grants, at HHS), State Government (Merril Oliver, Director, Maryland Governor's Grants Office), and the private sector (James Taylor, Managing Director Global Public Sector, Grant Thornton, LLP).

The Office of Management and Budget's Uniform Administrative Requirements, Cost Principles, and Audit Requirements for Federal Awards, better known as **The Uniform Guidance**, was initiated in December 2014. The guidance consolidated into a single document grant-related OMB Circulars A-21, A-87, A-110, A-122, A-89, A-102, and A-133; as well as the portion of Circular A-50 dealing with the Single Audit Act follow-up.

After defining terms such as the difference between a subrecipient and a contractor and DeMinimus Indirect Cost rates, our speakers discussed how the Guidance's intent has thus far worked out in practice.

The session looked at the progress and problems in implementing the government -wide framework for grants management. The speakers went over grants management changes that were made to implement the Uniform Guidance and discussed progress in achieving key objectives, ranging from strengthening oversight to streamlining federal requirements. They also examined how AGA tools, which are available online to anyone at no cost, can help implement key provisions of the Uniform Guidance.  $\underline{1/}$ 

Toward the end of the presentation, the speakers made a point of recognizing the professionalism of grant managers.

Finally, some time was spent on how regulation changes like The Uniform Guidance will be handled under the new administration's 2-for-1 regulatory requirement.
