December Meeting Minutes

December 13, 2005 Ozarks Chapter Meeting

Cindy Stein called the meeting to order at 12:30 PM. The minutes from the previous meeting were read and approved. Cindy presented the Treasurer's report, which was then approved as read.

Cindy asked the group to review and discuss how much the chapter should offer in scholarships this year. Dr Richard Nichols moved \$1,500 be offered as in the previous year, Dr Penny Clayton seconded and the motion passed by unanimous voice vote.

Cindy reiterated that GFOA would be sponsoring the David Osborne seminar "Budgeting for Outcomes". For details please refer to the latest chapter newsletter.

Kathyrn Burnett announced next year's annual seminar will be held in a new location. It will be at the Lamplighter Inn North on North Glenstone. The Sheraton was already booked for the dates we needed and upon investigation Kathyrn determined the Lamplighter Inn to be a great alternative.

Cindy stated that although Hammon's Towers Club is increasing the cost for the luncheon meals it would not be necessary to increase our monthly fees for this year.

Kathyrn introduce the luncheon speaker, Dr Dick Williams. Dr Williams is the Director of the School of Accountancy at Missouri State University. He has been at MSU for sixteen years and spoke about education for the accounting student.

Dr Williams discussed the structure of the College of Business Administration (COBA) and the School of Accountancy (SOA). He indicated the COBA accounted for 30% of student population currently and that there had been a 30% increase in students since 2002. There is an apparent shift from information systems majors to accounting majors.

Dr Williams then went on to discuss the process of becoming accredited by AACSB. The COBA has been accredited since 1992, when our own Dr Richard Nichols helped obtain the accreditation and then reaffirmed again in 2002. As part of the process there is a five-year review or visit that will occur next year when two deans from other accredited schools will visit the COBA and two other deans will visit the SOA.

According to Dr Williams the accreditation process focuses on the schools mission, the participants and learning. He went into some detail describing how the reviewers determine the quality of students; staff and learning and what efforts are being made at MSU to continue to maintain and raise the standards necessary keep accreditation.

After a question and answer period, Cindy asked for assist to carry the Toys for Tots and food donations to her car then adjourned the meeting.

You get a message that says your mailbox is 'out of limits.' You cannot send or receive messages. What do you do?

It sounds like your mailbox is full. The administrators who run your mail servers give your mailbox a set amount of storage space. When you fill it up, generally you can't use your mail service until you free up some space. You can use several techniques to clean out and manage your mailbox:

Manually delete old or unwanted messages

Typically, messages with attachments (such as sound and image files and large spreadsheets) take up the most space. You can move messages to your **Deleted Items** folder, or you can delete them permanently:

- 1. Sort your messages to find the types of messages that you want to move or delete. For example, you can find all messages with attachments by clicking **Sort by: Attachment**1. You can also use **Advanced Find** (CTRL+SHIFT+F) to search for messages from a given sender or for messages that contain a common word or phrase.
- 2. Select the unwanted messages.
- 3. Do one of the following:
 - ❖ Press DELETE to move the messages to your **Deleted Items** folder.
 - ❖ Press SHIFT+DELETE to permanently delete the messages.
 - Drag the messages to a folder on your hard drive to move them to the folder.

Automatically archive files to a Personal Folders file (.pst)

This method involves the least amount of labor on your part. By default, Outlook does this for you every three months using a feature called AutoArchive. If you fill your mailbox before then, you can change the AutoArchive interval or start AutoArchive manually. Set up Inbox rules



Power plant initiative being changed because of legality questions

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A petition aimed at blocking City Utilities from building a coal-fired power plant for at least four years violates the city charter, City Attorney Dan Wichmer told the News-Leader this morning.

The city charter allows CU to construct power plants, and a ballot question that would block that authority would not be legal, Wichmer said.

Because of Wichmer's opinion, Citizens for Affordable Energy plans to change the wording of the proposed ballot question it hopes to put before city voters June 6.

Lance Wright, chairman of the group, said the new ballot language will be more advisory in nature.

Wright plans to unveil the new ballot proposal at noon today in front of CU headquarters.
