

The Crabby Office Lady

No matter how much you use Word or how well you think you know it, there are always handy little shortcuts, options, and magical roads you can take to get the job done. Some of my readers already know this.

Microsoft Word 2003

Tip #1: Copy a group of Excel cells into a Word document and make it look goooood.

- 1. Select your cells in Excel.
- 2. Copy (Ctrl+ C).
- 3. In your Word document, on the **Edit** menu, click **Paste Special**.
- 4. Click Microsoft Office Excel Worksheet Object, and then click OK.

See? These two programs really can play nice together

Tip #2: Create a new file lickety-split

S.S. of California wrote to me with a fantastic tip, a shortcut really, for creating a new Word doc (or PowerPoint presentation, Excel workbook, or any other Office file): Instead of creating a new file by going to **Start** > **Application** > **File** Menu > **New**, create a shortcut on your desktop that will do all this for you:

Right-click anywhere on your desktop, point to **New**, and then click the type of Office document you want to use as a shortcut.

Now, whenever you need to start a new document, spreadsheet, or whatever, two clicks is all it takes.

Tip #3: Add a break from within a list

Sometimes you want to add a note or a break from within list items, kind of like this:

Here is the first item

And here is the break.

And here is the second item.

Rather than turning off the list and messing around with the margins, **J.B. of Wisconsin** wrote with the quick and easy solution: Shift + Enter. That will maintain the margins, move the cursor on to the next line, and not generate a new bullet or number. How sweet it is.

Budgeting for Outcomes

Getting the Results You Need in

Presenter: David Osborne is the author or co-author of five books: *The Price of Government:* Getting the Results We Need in an Age of Permanent Fiscal Crisis (2004); The Reinventor's Fieldbook: Tools for Transforming Your Government (2000), Banishing Bureaucracy: The Five Strategies For Reinventing Government (1997), Reinventing Government (1992), and Laboratories of Democracy (1988). He has also authored numerous articles for the Washington Post, the Atlantic, the New York Times Magazine, Harpers, Inc., Governing, and other publications.

In government, as in most realms of life, we find it safer and easier to do what we have always done, simply because we have always done it. Only on rare occasions do we step back to gain a broader perspective, erase all our pre-conceived ideas and routine behaviors, and take a fresh look at how to make the most of our limited time and resources.

This satellite teleconference will help public leaders do just that each and every budget year. Specifically the training will focus on the following six steps.

- 1. SET THE PRICE OF GOVERNMENT: Decide up front how much citizens are willing to spend. Get political agreement on a revenue forecast and any tax or fee increases.
- 2. SET THE PRIORITIES OF GOVERNMENT: Define the out-comes that matter most to citizens, along with indicators to measure progress. By outcomes we mean results such as improved education levels, better health, and lower crime rates.
- 3. SET THE PRICE OF EACH PRIORITY: Take 10 percent off the top for overhead and divide the rest of the revenue among the priority outcomes.
- 4. DEVELOP A PURCHASING PLAN FOR EACH PRIORITY: Create "results teams" (steering organizations) to act as purchasing agents for the citizens. Ask each one to decide which strategies have the most impact on their desired outcomes.
- 5. SOLICIT OFFERS TO DELIVER THE DESIRED RESULTS: Have the results teams issue "requests for results" to all comers, public and private.
- 6. NEGOTIATE PERFORMANCE AGREEMENTS WITH THE CHOSEN PROVIDERS: These should spell out the expected out-puts and outcomes, how they will be measured, the consequences for performance, and the flexibilities granted to help the provider maximize performance.

IRS Announces 2006 Standard Mileage Rates

WASHINGTON — The Internal Revenue Service today issued the 2006 optional standard mileage rates used to calculate the deductible costs of operating an automobile for business, charitable, medical or moving purposes.

Beginning Jan. 1, 2006, the standard mileage rates for the use of a car (including vans, pickups or panel trucks) will be:

- o 44.5 cents per mile for business miles driven;
- o 18 cents per mile driven for medical or moving purposes; and
- 14 cents per mile driven in service of charitable organizations, other than activities related to Hurricane Katrina relief.

IRS Warns of e-Mail Scam about Tax Refunds

WASHINGTON — The Internal Revenue Service today issued a consumer alert about an Internet scam in which consumers receive an e-mail informing them of a tax refund. The e-mail, which claims to be from the IRS, directs the consumer to a link that requests personal information, such as Social Security number and credit card information.

This scheme, called phishing, is an attempt to trick the e-mail recipients into disclosing their personal and financial data. The information fraudulently obtained is then used to steal the taxpayer's identity and financial assets.

The bogus e-mail, which claims to come from "tax refunds@irs.gov," tells the recipient that he or she is eligible to receive a tax refund for a given amount. It then says that, to access a form for the tax refund, the recipient must use a link contained in the e-mail. The link then asks for the personal and financial information.

The IRS does not ask for personal identifying or financial information via unsolicited e-mail. Additionally, taxpayers do not have to complete a special form to obtain a refund. If you receive an unsolicited e-mail purporting to be from the IRS, take the following steps:

- Do not open any attachments to the e-mail
- Contact the IRS at 1-800-829-1040 to determine whether the IRS is trying to contact you about a tax refund.
