Dear Chapter Members,

This newsletter marks the end of this program year for the Washington, DC Chapter. This year has been a tremendous one as I look back at the number of educational and member service events held during the year.

This program year, we:

- Sold out all but one of the eight educational luncheons where wonderful presenters from the White House, OMB, Treasury, and other agencies spoke on a cornucopia of interesting topics, to include our last May luncheon where Major General Arnold Fields, Special Inspector General for Afghanistan Reconstruction presented and sang in support of civil servants;
- Honored our chapter members and award winners at our fabulous awards dinners and reception;
- Offered six educational audio conferences free of charge to members;
- Sponsored two CGFM courses for our members free of charge;



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Billing for Reimbursable Advances

Background

Inside the Black Box

Accounting is the language of business. The journals track business status through transactions of accounting significance. However, sometimes an agency wishes to track an action that does not have accounting significance. The Standard General Ledger (SGL) recognizes some internal accounting

transactions, such as internal allocations of funding using accounts 4520 through 4580. Others, like billing for reimbursable advances, have no SGL recognition.

Null

The easiest way to account for an advance bill is to do no postings. The billing agency doesn't have a right to the funding, though it does have the right to refuse to perform any work until it collects the advance. This also avoids the problem of reporting these bills on the Receivable Report (on what used to be the Schedule 9 of the SF-220): if the agency cancels the bill or collects less than what was billed, it really isn't written off; and if the agency collects more, it doesn't have to refund it or transfer the excess to the General Fund the way it usually has to for an over-collection of a bill. However, billing for advances can be a very significant activity for a fund or even an agency, and the agency may want to track it in their general ledger.

Memorandum Accounts

The SGL does allow agencies to post agency-specific statistical and memorandum data in the 9000 series. If an agency takes this option and requires double-entry bookkeeping, they might create accounts like:

- 9131 Bills for Reimbursable Advances Issued
- 9132 Bills for Reimbursable Advances Collected
- 9133 Bills for Reimbursable Advances Reduced
- 9231 Reimbursable Advances Billed not Collected

The agency may just choose to create 9131 and 9231, posting debit 9131 credit 9231 when bills are increased and debit 9231 credit 9131 when bills are reduced or collected. If the agency does post to 9132 and 9133 as activity accounts, both 9132 and 9133 would be closed to 9131 at the end of the year. Only if the agency automatically cancels the bills at year-end should they close 9231 into 9131; otherwise, they stay open from year to year.

Full Posting

The SGL entry for collecting an advance against an existing agreement is:

C184 Debit 1010 Fund Balance with Treasury Debit 4222 Unfilled Customer Orders with Advance Credit 2310 Liability for Advances and Prepayments Credit 4221 Unfilled Customer Orders without Advance

Inside the Black Box (Cont'd)

If we replace 1010 with 1310 Accounts Receivable, then 4222 is no longer synchronized with proprietary cash. If we eliminate the 4222 entry, then it is no longer synchronized with 2310. Also, 1310 is normally synchronized with 4251 Reimbursements and Other Income Earned – Receivable. So the only way to keep all these relationships intact is to add 4252, to offset the cash impact of 4222 and the earned reimbursements of 4251, as follows:

Debit 1310 Accounts Receivable Debit 4222 Unfilled Customer Orders with Advance Debit 4251 Reimbursements and Other Income Earned – Receivable Credit 2310 Liability for Advances and Prepayments Credit 4221 Unfilled Customer Orders without Advance Credit 4252 Reimbursements and Other Income Earned – Collected

This is not a very satisfactory solution, since it posts accounts that track activity that has not occurred. Also, an agency with significant bills for advances will have a very strange looking SF-133 and Statement of Budgetary Resources, as SBR line 3D1a and SF-133 lines 1700 and 1800 (mapped to account 4252) will go negative.

Proprietary-Only Posting

One way to avoid strange updates to the SF-133 and SBR is to record the entry only in the proprietary accounts (1310 and 2310). In order to maintain the relationships of 1310 to 4251 and 2310 to 4222, a special subaccount for 1310 can be used that maps to 4222 instead of to 4251, such as:

Debit 1310.20 Accounts Receivable – Reimbursable Advances Credit 2310.20 Liability for Advances and Prepayments - Uncollected

The agency still will have to take care to exclude 1310.20 from the Report on Receivables. Alternatively, the agency can avoid posting to receivables by posting the debit to a special subaccount of 2310, such as:

Debit 2310.90 Contra Liability for Advances and Prepayments Still Receivable Credit 2310 Liability for Advances and Prepayments

Conclusion

Bills for advances have no real accounting impact and the null posting option is probably best. Agencies that use their general ledger to track bills, however, may want to consider a statistical or proprietary-only model.

Background

I serve the American taxpayer in

OMB's Office of Federal Financial Management (OFFM) by having primary responsibility for policy oversight and direction of OMB's financial audit guidance. I also have responsibility for providing financial management and reporting guidance to Executive branch agencies. In 2006, I served as a manager in the Enterprise Risk Services area of Deloitte & Touche's Federal Practice. Prior to Deloitte & Touche, I worked as a staff accountant in the Treasury Department's Office of the Fiscal Assistant Secretary from December 2003 until February 2006. At Treasury, I was responsible for preparing the Management's Discussion & Analysis of the Financial Report of the U.S. Government and providing technical accounting expertise to Treasury's Federal Accounting Standards Advisory Board member.

I have also worked as an auditor in the Inspectors General Offices of the Legal Services Corporation, Office of Personnel Management, and the Environmental Protection Agency. I hold a BS in Accounting from George Mason University and I am a licensed CPA in VA and DC, as well as a Certified Management Accountant (CMA), Certified Internal Auditor (CIA), and CGFM.

<u>4th Annual National Community Service Project</u> Habitat for Humanity for Katrina Victims

This year we participated in the 4th Annual National Community Service Project. When we received the notice about the annual project we were just as enthusiastic as we were last year. So plans were made and we descended upon the New Orleans worksite ready and willing to do our part from April 26 – 30, 2010. We met new and veteran volunteers from around the nation. Some came from Missouri, Oklahoma, Michigan, Maine, Colorado, Pennsylvania, Virginia and Washington, DC as well as New Orleans. Veterans from our New Orleans Chapter worked along with us and taught us quite a few things. We had a great mix and a multitude of talents from the public and private sectors.

We had a total of 14 volunteers in our group, an increase over the past year. On our first day we focused on new structures; working from the ground floor to the roof on three houses. The real excitement surfaced when we learned that several of the volunteers from the New Orleans area were prospective Habitat

homeowners. Three of the workers could not have been more excited about the progress we made because they had a vested interested in getting their own houses built and racking up their required 350 hours of work before taking occupancy. Our days were spent installing and caulking windows and doors, putting up insulation, painting, roofing, and retrofitting a few things that did not work as contemplated. This time our Senior RVP at large, Karl Boettcher, exhibited unforeseen ingenuity in retrofitting a window and frame that was destined to be discarded because of its unusual size. But Karl persevered in building up the frame and making a perfect fit. Such team work and ingenuity inspired us to complete more work on the three houses than we, along with the Habitat staff, had ever imagined we could. Again, the New Orleans Chapter put out the welcoming mat, coming with Creole and Cajun hot lunches each day and, of course, Past National President Clyde McShan and wife Debbie made us feel as though we never wanted to leave New Orleans. When we sat down in their courtyard to enjoy an incredible allowance of crawfish, corn on the cob, potatoes and all manner of desserts with beverages that were too numerous to mention, we thought we'd eat ourselves into oblivion. Past National President Jullin Renthrope and other New Orleans Chapter members joined us at the worksite and at the crawfish boil.

And let us not forget to thank the Capital Region—Montgomery - Prince Georges, Northern Virginia, and Washington DC Chapters for again providing AGA Habitat tee shirts for each of us.


