Update on Winter and Spring CGFM Training Classes

New CGFM Scholarship Program

In an effort to provide new programs and opportunities to help our members achieve their CGFM certification goals, the DC Chapter is proud to announce that we will be providing a CGFM Scholarship Program for the first time this year. Recipients will be reimbursement the full cost of their exam and registration fees, once they have passed the exam. Please keep a look out for program details, including rules and eligibility, in an announcement that will be posted this month to the Chapter Website, and sent via email notification using the Chapter email distribution list.

CGFM Chapter Incentive \$20 Rebate for Applicants

Have you been waiting for yet another great reason to apply for the AGA CGFM Program? Well, through December 31st, the AGA is giving a rebate of \$20 for CGFM applications received with the assistance of AGA chapters. Here is how it works - In order to receive a \$20 rebate:

- Complete a CGFM application (application form, \$85 application fee and copy of the transcript) it must be received by AGA Office of Professional Certification by December 31, 2011.
- The CGFM application form must have the promotional phrase: "CGFM chapter promotion DC Chapter" (or whichever Chapter you belong to) written at the bottom of the form. If the application is submitted online, the applicant must put this phrase in the last question: "How did you learn about the CGFM Program?"

Important notes:

- > A full application fee of \$85 must be paid at the time of application. The \$20 check will be sent to the applicant by mail in January.
- > The applicant must put the words "CGFM chapter promotion" AND the name of your chapter on the application form in order to receive the rebate.
- > It is preferable that the applications are submitted by the applicants themselves and not by the chapter. The applicant does not have to be a chapter member in order to receive the rebate.

Luncheon Speaker: Elizabeth Robinson



Confirmed by the U.S. Senate on November 5, 2009, and sworn into office on November 9th, Elizabeth "Beth" Robinson is the Chief Financial Officer for the National Aeronautics and Space Administration. Through her leadership, Dr. Robinson ensures the financial health of the organization, including responsibility for ensuring that NASA resources are effectively employed toward the achievement of NASA's strategic plan. She manages the organization's budget and financial operations, directs the preparation and submission of annual financial and budgetary reports, and coordinates agency financial management activities with other federal agencies.

Prior to joining NASA, Robinson was the senior-most Office of Management and Budget career official, responsible for supporting the OMB Director in developing, publishing, and enacting the President's Budget request. As Assistant Director for Budget, she provided leadership in the preparation of budget proposals, database and documents; development and review of budget estimates; and development of budget procedures and budget accounting concepts.

Before becoming Assistant Director for Budget in September, 2005, Robinson served as the Deputy Director for the Congressional Budget Office, where she assisted the Director in the overall management of the organization and represented CBO on the Federal Accounting Standards Advisory Board.

Previously, Robinson served as OMB's Deputy Assistant Director for Budget Review and Concepts. Her primary responsibilities included overseeing the development of the President's discretionary budget request and associated budget documents; revisions to agency guidance and congressional scoring rules; issues arising in the execution of the budget; proposals for and Congressional action on appropriation bills; and policy analysis projects.

Prior to joining OMB's Budget Review Division, she worked as the OMB program examiner for energy issues, including the defense, intelligence, fossil energy, and science programs at the Department of Energy.

From 1994 to 1998, she was a staff member on the Committee on Science in the House of Representatives.

From 1989 to 1994, Robinson worked at the Congress's Office of Technology Assessment. Before that, she was an assistant professor of geophysics at Stanford University, having graduated from MIT with a Ph.D. in geophysics in 1987. She holds an undergraduate degree in physics from Reed College.

AGA Promotes Transparency Through Citizen Centric Reporting

What is Citizen Centric Reporting?

Seeing a need to provide more informative government reporting to the general public, AGA launched the Citizen Centric Report initiative. This report is a nicely designed template of 4 pages of information the average citizen would want to know. The first page covers general information such as population figures, regional characteristics and government goals. The second page covers performance of key missions and services. The third page addresses revenues and costs, and the fourth page examines future concerns and initiatives for the ensuing year. AGA envisioned the reports to be prepared annually, although each entity would set their own parameters and goals—perhaps issuing them more or less frequently.

This initiative is moving across governmental entities fast and for good reason. The CCR reports are fantastic examples of transparency to the constituency in a format that captures the essential message citizens want to know. The CCR is the "CliffNotes" of governance—within minutes the constituency will know the essential facts, figures, and future issues and initiatives of their governing entity. For the governing entity, CCR is a talking paper and report card, and for the citizens, CCR is engagement. If they know the facts, figures, and initiatives they will be better informed and can judge where their concerns might be.

Why AGA?

So, why is AGA engaged in this process? To quote AGA's Executive Director, "If not us, then who? If not now, then when?" AGA leaders saw a need for understandable transparency with the citizens served by government. It was all too evident that normal government financial reports were too extensive and cumbersome to read much less understand. The financial reports were written for the accountants, not the average citizen. AGA's initiative serves as a bridge to the outside world and window into government. AGA also recognized that the citizens have a need to know and governments need to be transparent.

What is AGA Doing?

With an assigned National Director and with tremendous grass roots support from several members in various chapters, a pilot project was started. These dedicated servants helped craft the templates and worked directly with local governments to develop a CCR. The results were astounding. To date there have been 60 CCRs prepared by all levels of government and the enthusiasm for these reports is growing nationwide. (You can view these reports on our website). But, it is not enough. The goal is to have government institutions embrace the CCR concept and use the system for the good of all. AGA has designated proliferation of the CCR as one of the highest priorities in 2011-2012 and built the organization to get there. A working group was formed to expand knowledge and execution of the CCR system. This group is charged with advising the Director and working with chapters in developing and distributing the CCR. Members of this group include the superstars who successfully launched the pilot projects.

Where is AGA Going?

Local chapter involvement is critical to the success of the CCR program. It is imperative for the chapters to recognize the need for government accountability to the citizenry. The successes we have had with the published reports bode well for proliferation over time. The chapters have a ready benchmark to work from, and the templates and instructions for use are available on the AGA website. http://www.agacgfm.org/citizen/.

Each chapter can take baby steps towards the process by creating a CCR for the chapter activity. Believe it or not, it is a fun activity to do and gives the chapter an easy reference for the chapter's finances and activities. The chapters' CCRs do not take a lot of time, generally between 4 and 9 hours. Additionally, chapters gain up

to 2000 points in the chapter recognition program. As of September 30, 2011, 30 chapters submitted CCRs to the AGA National Office.

The chapters can then move to assisting government entities in preparation of a CCR. This can be done by perusing the entity's website and crafting a CCR based on that information and meeting with government officials. Or, chapter representatives can schedule a meeting with government representatives and discuss and show example CCRs prepared by other government entities.

Nationally, the government entities compete for Certificates of Excellence in Citizen Centric Reporting.

So, we look forward to working with the chapters to spur this initiative forward and encourage each chapter to accept the responsibility to develop the CCR program in their chapter. 

A Look at the New Statement of Budgetary Resources - Sections 1 & 2

Introduction

Treasury has now released the format and mappings for the new Statement of Budgetary Resources (SBR). Looking at just the top sections, the new SBR is a lot easier to put together than the old one.

Revenue Related

The chart below compares the main lines of sections 1 and 2 between the two formats, leaving off some header and total lines. The first difference is that the new line numbers are four digits and not sequential. They only somewhat map to similar lines on the SF-133. One point of awkwardness is that lines 1000, 1020, and 1021 do agree between the two, and the SBR wants a subtotal of 1000 and 1020, so they created a line 1020.5. I think it would have been better to change 1020 to 1019 so 1020.5 can become 1020. Note that the SF-133 has lines 1011-1013 and 1022-1029 that do not cleanly map to the SBR.

The only split out of an old line into new lines is for beginning balance on line 1 (now 1000) by including all beginning balance adjustments as 1020 and subtotaling the two as line 1020.5. Most agencies will not have balances on line 1020, so this change should not require much effort to support. Recoveries remain on their own line (old 2, new 1021). All other activity on lines 3-6 are now split out strictly based on Authority Type. The activity that has no Authority Type, which had been split out between lines 4, 5 and 6 now ends up on line 1043. However, most of the postings to lines 4, 5 and 6 are divided between the new Authority Type lines. These lines are 1290 for appropriations (Type P and D), 1490 for borrowing (Type B), 1690 for contract (Type C), and 1890 for offsetting collections (Type S), although there are some Standard General Ledger accounts that are uniquely mapped to one of those lines that have other, or no, Authority Types. A comparison of which activity balances in part one go where by SGL account appears below. If the new SBR has multiple lines, then the aforementioned authority types are used to determine on which line the balance is reported.

There are five accounts that under the old SBR could appear on one of two lines based on authority type, and there are 24 such accounts on the new SBR (two of these map to three lines and one maps to four lines). An agency should be able to assign the account to the proper line based on the Treasury Account Symbol, but if the same symbol has multiple funding sources, it may necessary to create subaccounts to properly map to the SBR (of course, they would already have to do that for the SF-133). One line on the old SBR posted to two different lines based on whether the balance was a debit or a credit. The biggest change is that all seven of the offsetting collection entries, which indicated where in the process the funding was (anticipated, agreement, receivable, collected) are now all on line 1890.

Inside the Black Box (Cont'd)

Part two (old lines 7-11, new 2190-2500) is almost identical. The only difference is that the obligations are no longer split out by direct and reimbursable. So the entire balance of the SGL account can be assigned to line 2190.

Conclusion

The new SBR format for parts one and two is much cleaner and simpler than the old. Setting up the new report is easier than the old, and it should not take much effort to convert the old format to the new.
