

Luncheon Speaker: Helen Lew



Helen Lew is the first Inspector General at the Washington Metropolitan Area Transit Authority (WMATA), overseeing independent audits and investigations of WMATA's programs and operations. She retired from the Federal Government in April 2007 after 36 years. Prior to her retirement,

she was the Assistant Inspector General for Audits, Office of Inspector General (OIG), Department of Education (ED), where she was responsible for auditing and evaluating ED programs and operations. She chaired the Federal Audit Executive Council (FAEC) during the period July 2005 to April 2007; the FAEC is comprised of audit executives from federal audit agencies and departments. She also chaired the Project Advisory Board for the National Project to Statistically Measure the Quality of Single Audits. She was a member of the President's Council on Integrity and Efficiency working group that revised the Quality Standards for Federal Offices of Inspectors General, also known as the 'Silver Book.' Prior to joining ED OIG in November 2000, Ms. Lew worked for the U.S. Government Accountability Office (GAO) for 27 years. At GAO, she worked in the Washington Regional Office, Accounting and Financial Management Office, and Accounting and Information Management Division. Ms. Lew graduated from The American University in Washington, D.C. with a Bachelor of Science degree in Economics and Business. She holds a Management Information Systems Certificate from George Washington University in Washington, D.C. She is a Certified Public Accountant (Maryland), Certified Government Financial Manager, and Certified Inspector General. She is a member of the American Institute of Certified Public Accountants, Maryland Association of Certified Public Accountants, Association of Government Accountants (Washington D.C. Chapter), Association of Inspectors General, and American Public Transportation Association's Internal Audit Committee. She also was a 2007 recipient of the Presidential Rank Award of Meritorious Executive.


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Reimbursable versus Direct on the FY2010 SF-133

Background

The Office of Management and Budget has significantly revised the format of the SF 133 Report on Budget Execution for FY2010 to bring it in closer alignment with the Programming and Financing (P&F) Schedule. In the September column, I wrote about these changes using version one of the proposed format. However, since then version two has come out, with some significant changes, especially to how Section

Two reports reimbursable and direct spending.

Section One Changes

The changes to Section One between the two new versions is minor. There is a new section on Advance Appropriations composed of lines 1170-1174 with a total on line 1180. Lines 1170, 1171, and 1172 were originally reported on lines 1106, 1107, and 1108. Account 4392 for Advance Appropriations has been moved from line 1130 to a new line 1173, and the same was done for account 4382 from line 1132 to new line 1174. The same was done for lines 1205 and 1206 moving to 1271 and 1272, and accounts 4392 and 4382 moving to 1273 and 1274 for the mandatory spending. A new total line 1930 was added, but it seems to have the same value as line 1910. There is also a new line 1940 for expiring available amounts in SGL accounts 4450 through 4720.

Section Two Changes

This section is where the most significant changes are. The earlier version had line 2000 for Category A, 2011 through 2169 for Category B with one line per project, and 2170 for exempt from apportionment. The new version has direct spending split out between line 2001 for Category A, 2002 for B, and 2003 for exempt from apportionment, with a total on line 2004. The same structure is repeated for reimbursable spending on lines 2101, 2102 and 2103 with a total on 2104. The unobligated balances reported on lines 2180, 2181, and 2182 have been renumbered to lines 2201, 2202 and 2203. The exempt from apportionment available amounts on lines 2190, 2191, and 2192 have been renumbered to lines 2301, 2302 and 2303. The unapportioned amounts on lines 2200, 2201 and 2202 are now 2401, 2402 and 2403. The total lines 2210, 2211, and 2212 are now 2500, 2501, and 2502.

Section Three Changes

This is easy. There are none.

Section Four Changes

In the older version, line 4051 was Offsetting collections credited to expired accounts (discretionary) and this has been moved to line 4052 in the new version. A new line 4051 has been added which lists Change in uncollected customer payments from Federal sources (expired) (discretionary), which is basically line 4050 but for expired funds. Of course, the old line 4052 is now 4053. In the Mandatory section, the new line for expired funds is 4141, which pushed the old lines 4141 and 4142 to 4142 and 4143.



Free Certified Government Financial Manager (CGFM) **Training provided by AGA DC Chapter**

AGA DC Chapter six-day comprehensive courses are designed to meet the practical and professional development needs of financial managers at every level of government. They also provide the advanced knowledge to instill the confidence you need in order to sit for each of the three CGFM examinations.

The program is FREE for qualified enrollees and will address the three key components of the CGFM examination:

- Governmental Environment,
- Governmental Accounting, Financial Reporting and Budgeting; and
- Governmental Financial Management and Control.

The Program's <u>4 key eligibility criteria</u> are:

- 1. Being an active member of D.C., Northern Virginia or Montgomery/Prince George's County chapter of AGA (you can join now to meet this requirement).

Federal employees' health insurance premiums to rise 8.8 percent By Alyssa Rosenberg <u>arosenberg@govexec.com</u> September 29, 2009

The average amount federal employees pay for their health care will rise 8.8 percent in 2010, the Office of Personnel Management announced on Tuesday.

"An 8.8 percent increase is not an increase we feel comfortable with," said Nancy Kichak, associate director for strategic human resource policy at OPM. "It's not one that we would like to have to see our enrollees bear, but unfortunately we're a victim of the market. This is the cost we're experiencing."

The total average premium increase for plans in the Federal Employees Health Benefits Program will be 7.4 percent, or \$25.57 per pay period, OPM said. Of that figure, the government will absorb \$16.35 per pay period, increasing its contribution to employees' health care costs by 6.8 percent. That leaves federal employees with an average increase of \$9.21 in their premiums, or 8.8 percent.

Broken down by type of coverage, the typical employee will see premiums increase by \$5.98 per pay period for individual coverage, and by \$12.87 per pay period for family coverage.

Kichak said a number of factors are driving the increase, including the rising cost of health care in the United States, the aging of the federal workforce and the fact that 90,000 enrollees left the Blue Cross Blue Shield Standard Option. Many who switched to other plans were healthy, leaving the Standard Option with less income from enrollees who needed minimal care.

Monthly premiums for individuals enrolled in the Standard Option will rise 15.1 percent in 2010, or \$23.02. And premiums for families in the plan will grow 12.4 percent, or \$44.38.

The price of dental coverage will increase 4.2 percent, and the price for vision insurance will rise 2.4 percent, Kichak said.

"It keeps going up, much, much more than the average increase in pay," said Bill Bransford, general counsel for the Senior Executives Association. "Soon it's going to eat up all the salary increase and then some."

Colleen Kelley, president of the National Treasury Employees Union, said she was disturbed by the increase in premiums. This is the third straight year average FEHBP premiums have increased.

"These increases are coming even as OPM again uses money from reserves to keep the increases down," Kelley said. "Clearly, the need to leverage the size of the FEHBP has become even more apparent."

Kelley has long been an advocate for using FEHBP's large enrollment to try to negotiate more favorable prices on prescription drugs for plan participants, and she said the union brought up the issue during a meeting on FEHBP drug pricing and benefits in Washington on Tuesday.

Kichak said that in 2010, the American Postal Workers Union Health Plan would offer incentives to enrollees who switched to generic prescription drugs, which generally are priced lower than their brand-name equivalents.

And she said FEHBP plans to debut a number of other benefits changes in 2010. The agency is introducing <u>Managing</u> <u>My Own Health</u>, a suite of tools that will include personal health records employees can download, fill in and give to their doctors to avoid dangerous drug interactions and make providers aware of allergies and health histories. The tools also will feature ratings of how well different states and insurance plans perform in diagnosing and treating various conditions. Lorraine Dettman, assistant director for insurance services programs, said OPM met with agency benefits officers Tuesday morning to let them know about the new offerings, and would work with agencies to make sure employees were aware the forms were available.

FEHBP plans also will be required to cover treatment for mental health and substance abuse problems at the same level that they cover treatment for physical health issues. Kichak said that while FEHBP plans had been required to offer equivalent coverage for in-network mental health treatment since 2001, plans now must provide equivalent coverage for out-of-network treatment as well. In addition to mental health treatment, some health care policies will begin offering plans to help manage childhood obesity and diabetes, Kichak said.

While OPM does not have new policies to announce at present, the agency has begun a series of meetings with major insurance providers to see if there are changes it could make to drive down health insurance prices, Kichak said. OPM also is looking at co-payments on preventative treatment, which can reduce the overall cost of health care.

Open season, the period when federal employees can switch their enrollments in health benefits programs, will run from Nov. 9 to Dec. 14.

OK, I'm not patrolling Afghanistan with an M-16 risking my life, but I'm still serving the American public. Federal servants are often under appreciated and under paid but in my mind, that only enhances the nobility of our service.

What has been the biggest obstacle in getting where you are today? The AICPA losing my CPA exam in 1992. I had planned to move to DC from California as soon as I passed the test. After being informed that my exam was one of many that had been lost in shipment, my whole move/career change was put on hold for four months until I could retake the exam. I have the letter from the California State Board of Accountancy apologizing to me for losing my exam along with a front page newspaper clipping of the story hanging in my office and reminding me of that time. I remember reading that letter and immediately concluding: "OK, I just have to pass it again".

What is your favorite hobby or outside activity? Fixing stuff (e.g., bicycles, lawn mowers, pressure washers, anything with a small engine) and donating them to charity. I review/respond to approximately 60 emails a day but it's hard to feel like I've accomplished much. However, when I take a piece of junk, do something to it, and then it magically works, I feel like I've made a difference. This is especially true when you give that something to someone and they appreciate what you've done for them. I have yet to find a more rewarding feeling than doing something nice for somebody who appreciates it.

What is your favorite flavor of ice cream? Ice cream is a sad topic for me. I was fired from Baskin Robins when I was 16 for eating too much while on the job. I ate four brownies during an eight hour shift. The next day I was called into the Managers office. She had checked the sales register and saw that only one brownie had been sold. It was my first experience with internal control and one I've never forgotten.

Anything else that you would like to highlight? In my opinion, we (the Federal/State/Local financial industry) owe our country and our fellow citizens two things:

- A call to arms in regards to the impending fiscal crisis America faces with social security, health care, and other benefits. America has been fiscally irresponsible these last few decades and we need to be screaming "Hey America, we need to get our act together or we will be saddled with much higher taxes and significantly less benefits unless we make some sacrifices today". If we fail to do this and things progress as forecasted, there could be a huge backlash on our industry. If we raise the alarm now, we can either help prevent the turmoil currently forecasted or at least be able to confidently stand up and say: "Hey America, we've been screaming about this for years. Don't blame us because you failed to listen".
 - A government-wide clean opinion. Call it a pipe-dream if you want but I am working for the day when I'm sitting at home on the couch with a beer in hand and I hear the national news commentator telling the American people that for the 1st time in American history, the Federal government received an unqualified audit opinion. That is a day that our entire industry will be proud of and perhaps the American public will be just a little more appreciative of what we do for them on a daily basis.
