
# October 2017 Luncheon Topic The Search for Meaning - An Odyssey of Performance Measurement By Larisa Benson

We were honored to have Larisa Benson speak to us on October 17th. Ms. Benson is currently a principal consultant with the Athena Group and a senior lecturer at the University of Washinton's Daniel J. Evans School of Public Affairs. She previously served the Washington State Auditor's Office as Director of Performance Audits and worked for Governor Chris Gregoire as Director of Government Management Accountability and Performance.

Ms. Benson discussed processes she uses to improve organizational performance, including implementing LEAN techniques and collection of data before recommending improvements. Larisa pointed out some of the successes her approach

has produced, including a 70% speed up in one organization's document processing along with a similar improvement in quality of the output.



Ms. Benson also discussed things to look to eliminate while evaluating an organization's effectiveness and ways of improving. These include individuals taking on too much work (resulting in accomplishing less), bottlenecks in processes, and institutional resistance to change and acceptance of outside help.

They alleviate stress

s by connecting seniors and those who care about them to whatever they need to remain safe, active and healthy and they are committed to helping all people — especially those in low-income communities and communities of color to feel included and respected.

The U. S. Marine Corps Reserve Toys for Tots Program's local toy collection campaigns begin in October and last until mid to late December. Members of the community drop new, unwrapped toys in collection boxes positioned in local businesses. Coordinators pick up these toys and store them in central warehouses where the toys are sorted by age and gender. At Christmas, Coordinators, with the assistance of local social welfare agencies, church groups, and other local community agencies, distribute the toys to the less fortunate children of the community.
