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May Luncheon Speaker

To close out our program year, the May luncheon will feature remarks by Wendy M. Comes, CPA, the Executive Director of the Federal Accounting Standards Advisory Board (FASAB).

Ms. Comes has been with FASAB since its inception and has been directly involved in many of the standards promulgated. The currently chairs the Accounting and Auditing Policy Committee of the FASAB.

Prior to joining the FASAB staff in 1991, Ms. Comes worked in the utilities field. Her experience includes consumer advocacy and corporate financial planning. She served as an auditor and expert witness for the Public Staff of the North Carolina Utilities Commission. She represented the Navy's interests in utility rate cases around the country while employed by the Naval Facilities Engineering Command. With Potomac Electric Power Company, Ms. Comes was responsible for long term financial forecasting, cash planning and bond rating agency presentations.

Ms. Comes graduated with honors from the University of Virginia receiving a Bachelor of Science degree in Commerce. She is a member of the AICPA and AGA. She currently Chairs the AGA Professional Certification Board and is a member of the AGA Certificate of Excellence Board.

President's Message

ublic Service Recognition Week, celebrated the first Monday through Sunday in May, honors those of you who serve America as federal, state, and local government employees. AGA is made up of people, from both the public and private sector, who serve the public. Throughout the nation and around the world, public employees educate citizens about the many ways in which government serves the people and how government services make life better for all of us. AGA's primary mission is to educate members and the public on government financial management. It is therefore fitting that AGA celebrate Public Service Recognition Week and vice versa.

When I think of public servants who, in my mind, richly deserve recognition (and the list changes frequently), one person always on my "Top 10" list is the late Barbara Jordan, former Congresswoman from Texas. Barbara Jordan practiced the art of public service and preached on the value of being a public servant. She left us many memorable quotes and speeches, including her keynote address at the 1976 Democratic National Convention (a classic). Following is the text of a speech she delivered in April 1988 to a group of IRS employees at the Austin (Texas) Compliance Center. Over the years, it has given me a lot of inspiration and I want to share it with you.

The Importance of Public Service

"The work that you do as public servants is important work and you are servants

of the public. I don't know whether you feel that the public appreciates the job that you do, but do you know, if you didn't do your job the republic would collapse? Think about that. If you think your work is not important, think of what it would be like in the United States of America if people who owe taxes didn't pay them. Think of what it would be like if this government had no money for defense, or any other purpose. Think of what it would be like, this great experiment of ours that we know as the United States of America—a democratic republic."

"We have celebrated the Constitution [since 1787]. What are we celebrating? This unique experiment. Abraham Lincoln gave us a trilogy we use as a definition of democracy. But my problem with Abraham Lincoln's trilogy is that we put emphasis on the wrong words. The trilogy is: of, by, for the people. When we recite the trilogy we say OF the people, BY the people, FOR the people. You know how you should recite that? You should say of the PEOPLE, by the PEOPLE, for the PEOPLE. This is a government which has as its base, people. This is a republic which says, "here the people will govern." If the people fail to govern, there is no government. Without the consent of the people, the government fails. In order for the government then to be sustained and remain viable, the people have to support it. And you as public servants collect the revenues which help the people to support the government. We cannot afford to do less than our best effort to see that this government remain strong and free and accountable and responsible and responsive to people. And you as government servants, you as public servants, you are those who have that responsibility." [highlights are mine]

"I hope that you wear the badge of public service well, because you are called upon to be the most selfless people in the world. You are called upon to act on behalf of the public interest—not your
