Donald Hammond, Treasury Fiscal Asst. Secretary, soon to be Federal Reserve System board of governors.

The opinion on the Governmentwide Financial Report (FR) really hasn't changed overall, but there are the beginnings of a remarkable difference. Between 2005 and 2006, a lot of issues dropped off (though this did not change the conclusion). Data management and quality is improving, there is greater clarity on what disclosures are required, so attention is now focused on what is material and meaningful. Treasury started the FR process from *C*

scratch, the prototypes (starting in the 1970s) weren't read thoroughly, and only now is the process starting to stabilize. It is possible the FR may get an opinion within 5 years (though not a clean opinion). The first goal was to be complete and timely. NASA and DoD have huge accounting issues in that they have been using systems that don't capture the necessary data. Eliminations are still the #1 issue. Treasury has put in place integovernmental business rules to tackle the eliminations issue, and these should pay off soon. OMB is assisting currently by developing meaningful metrics and forming a dispute resolution committee.

June 2008 is the first quarter where agency complete financial information is required for the quarter, first governmentwide interim statement. BPD will soon be issuing balances daily for the federal debt.

TAS-BETC (pronounced taz betsy) will be required on all cash transactions soon (August 2008). This will free up people from bookkeeping to do real financial management.

Integrated reporting: same information is currently sent to many different systems on different reports. FMS will be consolidating reporting requirements.

Cost accounting: agencies should want to do it, assists management in making decisions. Very time intensive, need FTEs in place at start. Need commitment of program people. A good handle on costs and how they relate to outputs helps under budget constraints to maximize outputs, also helps with budget formulation.

COMMUNITY SERVICE NEWSLETTER

December was a very exciting month for the AGA's Washington D.C. Chapter in the area of community service. Beyond Checking the Box VI's Just <u>Not Enough</u> to Do Just Enough...

Inside the Black Box by Simcha Kuritzky, CGFM CPA

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Use Standard General Ledger Account or Accounting Code?

Background

Last month, I commented generally on the exposure draft on a Common Governmentwide Accounting Classification (CGAC) system. This month, I tackle one of the on-going debates within the federal accounting community: just what should the Standard General Ledger (SGL) account include?

Structure

In the private sector, companies get to determine their own general ledger structure and nomenclature. GAAP requires certain kinds of accounts, but does not dictate how detailed the chart should be or how to number them. For example, a company can use one general ledger account for all of their time-deposit accounts, or could assign each one a separate general ledger account. The federal government's SGL structure not only meets GAAP requirements, but also a number of reporting requirements unique to the federal government. However, it does not meet all of them.

Reducing Extra Codes

In order to supplement SGL accounts, the Office of Management and Budget (OMB) and Treasury's Financial Management Service (FMS) have added a number of codes. For example, it is not enough to know whether interest revenue was earned on loans, investments, or other transactions (this split-out was introduced in FY2004, before then, there was only one interest revenue SGL account); additional codes are required to identify whether the revenue is custodial or part of an exchange transaction. This effectively makes the account code six characters long. But why use additional codes instead of adding more SGL accounts? For custodial, there are only ten asset accounts (mostly receivables), one liability, 14 revenue and one expense account that could be either custodial or not. This field could be eliminated by adding 26 new SGL accounts. Similarly, the exchange flag could be eliminated by adding 25 new accounts. If this information is important enough to track as part of the SGL. Also, it is likely that there are some accounts that don't need these flags. If anyone can explain how interest on investments can be nonexchange, please email me.

A better example is the subsequent/current availability flag for 4510 Apportionments and 4590 Apportionments - Anticipated Resources - Programs Subject to Apportionment accounts. It is really important for an agency to know if funding is available. So important that 4610 Allotments - Realized Resources is in a separate account from the aforementioned 4590, 4630 Funds Not Available for Commitment/Obligation, and 4650 Allotments - Expired Authority. So why not split 4510 into 4511 for current and 4512 for subsequent availability, and 4590 into 4591 and 4592, and eliminate the flag? Currently many agencies create their own general ledger accounts to capture this information anyway. (Inside the Black Box Cont'd)

Reducing Extra Accounts

Conversely, if the SGL chart of accounts is getting too cluttered, why not replace many of the current accounts with flags? For example, use 4600 for available funds and include a flag indicating whether it is subject to apportionment, has been apportioned, is expired, is unavailable, or available? Or we could eliminate many of the accounts 4130 through 4150 for borrowing, contract, and reapportioned authority and use the existing Authority Type flag with the regular appropriation accounts, just as this flag is used for most of the authority reduction accounts in the 4382 to 4397 series.

Conclusion

Standardizing federal agencies' accounting structure could yield many benefits, but we should be careful not to freeze in place make-shift practices. The current GCAC proposal accepts without question that all FACTS codes are necessary. If we are really serious about meaningful standardization, we need to take a hard look at how the SGL is structured and see whether some of these extraneous codes could be incorporated. At a minimum, the level of detail should be consistent across SGL accounts-we should either capture an attribute in the SGL for all accounts, or use a separate flag for all accounts.

Annual CGFM Renewal Time

It is time to renew your CGFM designation and/or AGA membership! Below you'll find answers to frequently asked questions about CGFM renewal:

Q: How often do I have to renew my CGFM designation?

A: CGFM certification is renewed on an annual basis. A renewal invoice is sent out in February and the payment is due by March 31st. If you do not receive an invoice by mid-March, please call AGA at 1.800.AGA.7211.

If your address has recently changed, please be sure to update your contact information with AGA and pay your dues in the "Members only" section of AGA website (www.agacgfm.org).

Q: What are the requirements for maintaining the CGFM certification in an active status?

A: To maintain the CGFM certification in an active status, CGFMs are required to:

-- Pay the CGFM renewal fee by the due date every year.

-- Complete at least 80 hours of continuing professional education (CPE) every two years in government financial management topics or related technical subjects.

-- Maintain and, if requested by AGA, provide detailed information on CPE hours completed.

To retain the CGFM certification, all CGFMs must adhere to the AGA's Code of Ethics. By submitting their annual renewal payment, CGFMs affirm that they have and will continue to abide by AGA's Code of Ethics and that they have fulfilled the minimum CPE Requirements.

Q: How do I determine my CPE cycle?

A: Your first two-year CPE cycle starts on January 1st of the year following the one when your CGFM was awarded (for example, if your CGFM was awarded in 2001, your first CPE cycle was 1/1/02-12/31/03). The

award date is listed on your CGFM certificate. Your current CPE cycle is listed on your renewal invoice. For a table of all CPE cycles visit www.agacgfm.org/cgfm/maintain/cgfm_calendar.aspx.

Q: My two-year CPE cycle just ended on December 31, 2006, but I did not complete 80 CPEs in 2005-2006. Can I make up the deficiency?

A: Yes. CGFMs who have not completed the 80 CPE hours in 2005-2006 cycle have until March 31, 2007 to make up the deficiency. Any CPE hours completed toward a deficiency in one period must be documented in the CPE records and may not be counted toward the requirements for the next two-year period. Q: I just retired. Do I need to do anything to adjust my CGFM status to "retired"?

A: Yes. Individuals who are retired from AND are no longer substantially working in the government financial management community can request an adjustment of their status to "retired" by contacting AGA's Office of Professional Certification (by mail or e-mail at <u>agacgfm@agacgfm.org mailto:agacgfm@agacgfm.org</u> - please provide the date of retirement and confirm that you are no longer substantially working in the government financial management community). CGFMs in retired status are not required to remit the CGFM renewal fee or earn the 80 CPE hours.

If retired CGFMs return to work (substantial employment or contracting) in the government financial management community, they must contact AGA to change their status back to "active."

Currently, the Washington DC chapter is AGA's largest, proudly boasting well over 1400 active members.

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
