What's New at FASAB?

January 8, 2004 Luncheon Meeting



Ms. Wendy Comes

At our January 8 luncheon meeting at the Bank of America, 730 15th St. NW, Wendy Comes, Executive Director of the Federal Accounting Standards Advisory Board (FASAB), will speak on new FASAB initiatives. FASAB is reviewing its conceptual framework from the ground up and is also addressing increasingly complex liability issues. These efforts may impact the recognition of liabilities for a variety of social insurance programs, treaties, contract obligations and environmental liabilities. Ms. Comes will share her views on agencies' relationships with FASAB, including effective responses to exposure drafts. This is an excellent opportunity to hear what's on the horizon and what agencies should do to be prepared.

Wendy Comes is the FASAB Executive Director. Ms. Comes has been with FASAB since its inception and has been directly involved in many of the standards promulgated. As executive director, she manages the research staff supporting Board deliberations. She currently chairs the Accounting and Auditing Policy Committee of the FASAB. The committee provides implementation guidance for FASAB standards.

Prior to joining the FASAB staff in 1991, Ms. Comes worked in the utility field. Her experience includes consumer advocacy and corporate financial planning. She served as an auditor and expert witness for the Public Staff of the North Carolina Utilities Commission. She represented the Navy's interests in utility rate cases throughout the country while employed by the Naval Facilities Engineering Command. With Potomac Electric Power Company, Ms. Comes was responsible for long term financial forecasting, cash planning and bond rating agency presentations.

Ms. Comes graduated with distinction from the University of Virginia with a Bachelor of Science degree in Commerce. She is a member of the American Institute of Certified Public Accountants and the Association of Government Accountants. She has served as chairperson of the AGA Professional Certification Board, President of the AGA's Washington DC Chapter, and member of the AICPA's Members in Government Committee and Group of 100. She has published in the Journal of Accountancy and is the author of the federal portion of the AGA's Study Guide for CGFM Exam 2 – Governmental Accounting, Financial Reporting and Budgeting.

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


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Using the Intra-Governmental Transactions Portal (IGTP)

Reconciling Eliminations

In order to assist in reconciliations between federal agencies, the Office of Management and Budget (OMB) has instituted a web portal to record and manage interagency transactions. The problem of non-matching reports of interagency transactions has been known for decades. Also known was the fact that such transactions can be very complex, especially now that agencies are required to break the transactions out by General Ledger (GL) account, and not just track the cash flow or expenditure of authority (which continues to be a problem by itself). Only the great advances made recently in computing power and telecommunications has permitted the federal government to attempt a comprehensive solution.

One for One

The guidance from Treasury FMS and OMB is good, and I won't replicate it here. However, the examples they give only capture some of the complexities of interagency transactions, such as timing and GL account posting, but all the transactions shown are between two entities. One of the complexities innate to government transactions is the use of multiple funding sources, something that is meaningful to only the purchaser.

Two or More for One

For example, an agency rents space from GSA. The rental comes from several different managers' allotments. It might also come from different Fund Symbols (especially now that multi-year funds are increasingly common). The space allocation may change during the year. The costs associated with rent might also be allocated after the fact, which would force GSA to adjust bills that they thought were closed.

Solutions

The easiest solution is to break out the order into separate orders for each funding source. This assumes the allocation is done in advance, and is worthwhile only if the amounts are significant. What does an agency do if both of these do not hold true?

If the purchaser has a revolving fund, they could put the contract under its authority, then get reimbursed as the costs are allocated. Currently, such an allocation would be recorded on Treasury's Statement of Transactions (such as the SF-224). Once these monthly statements go away, it would be necessary to enter the intra-agency allocation transaction itself into the portal.

If the purchaser does not have a revolving fund, then one funding source could be the point of contact for the transaction and use its symbol. The allocation would be performed with an expenditure transfer (reducing costs and expenditures for the contact source and increasing them for the allocated source). Again, this would need to be reported on the Statement of Transactions or in the portal if different Fund Symbols are used (but not if the allocation is between allotments using the same Fund Symbol). If the amounts are significant enough for the contact allotment, it may be necessary to record the expenditure transfer before the expenditure takes place (in order to prevent the allotment from going deficient). So long as both pieces take place in the same month, the timing should not cause any reporting problems.

Another solution is to separate the funding from the cost. Give the point of contact allotment all the funding for this contract, so expenditure transactions are not needed (if multiple Fund Symbols are involved, then Congressional and OMB approval is necessary). The contact allotment would hold the budget, but record the various cost centers (allotments) associated with the contract for purposes of calculating net cost and performance measures.







AGA Launching CEAR Evaluations Early

AGA is launching the Certificate of Excellence in Accountability Reporting (CEAR) Program evaluations early and extending the option for federal agencies to submit their Fiscal Year 2003 Performance and Accountability Reports (PARs) and related documents anytime between now and March 1, 2004. Participants will receive the evaluation results approximately 12 weeks after submission, which will allow sufficient time to consider and incorporate the review panel's recommendations into Fiscal Year 2004 PARs due to the U.S. Office of Management and Budget on Nov. 15, 2004. NASA Official: Congress Should Encourage Linking Budgets, Performance

Agencies will have no incentive to manage programs efficiently and prepare thorough reports documenting their results if they believe that lawmakers are not paying attention, a NASA management adviser said Tuesday. Without cooperation from Congress, the Bush administration will have difficulty prompting federal agencies to get the most bang for their budgets, said Lloyd Blanchard, senior adviser for financial management at NASA. President Bush's five-part management agenda asks agencies to consider the performance of past projects when formulating budget requests. In turn, Congress is expected to base funding decisions partly on agencies' progress at meeting goals. If Congress fails to do so, it sends the wrong message to agencies. he said. Blanchard spoke at a Capitol Hill workshop hosted by the Mercatus Center, a Fairfax, VA-based policy institute run by George Mason University.

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Management Internship Program Expands

Mid-career professionals will soon be able to participate in the 26-year-old Presidential Management Intern Program. The White House has ordered the program's name changed to the "Presidential Management Fellows Program." The renamed program will remain open to recent graduates of advanced degree programs in various disciplines, but will also leave room for mid-career professionals with significant leadership potential to enter

as "senior fellows." A U.S. Office of Personnel Management (OPM) spokesman declined to offer a timeline or other details about the program's changes, but he did say that OPM and the White House would collaborate over the coming months to create a "greatly expanded, prestigious" program.

New Website Ranks Best Places to Work in Federal Government

The Partnership for Public Service, together with the Institute for the Study of Public Policy Implementation, has launched the Best Places to Work in the Federal Government website (www.bestplacestowork.org). It is the first-of-its-kind ranking of federal organizations and the most comprehensive rating of employee satisfaction in federal government agencies to date.

The rankings use the opinions of more than 100,000 federal workers to rate nearly every federal agency and sub-agency in the executive branch. The employee satisfaction data was collected in OPM's 2002 Federal Human Capital Survey.

Women Still Unable to Bridge the Salary Gap

Women in the accounting, finance and banking profession are earning 28 percent less than their male counterparts, according to a report released Wednesday by online career site CareerBank.com. The report also said the salary gap between men and women remained about the same as last year, with women earning an average of \$19,596 less than men in 2003 compared to an average of \$19,448 less in 2002. Employees are being paid 8 percent more than last year, the survey went on to say. "In a tough economic market, we see employees being asked to take on more responsibility to make up for other positions that have been downsized," said Robert G. Epstein, CareerBank.com



In its fourth year, the CareerBank.com Salary Survey is conducted annually through an online survey form. The 2003 survey results are based on the voluntary responses of 2,900 professionals in the accounting, finance and banking industries.

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
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
