Experience — have at least two years of professional-level experience in government financial management

Technical Updates Corner—FASAB and GASB

Federal Accounting Standards Advisory Board (FASAB)

March 15, 2019—FASAB Issues Interpretation of Federal Financial Accounting Standards 8: An Interpretation of Statement of Federal Financial Accounting Standards 56, *Classified Activities*

The objective of SFFAS 56 is to balance the need for financial reports to be publicly available with the need to prevent the disclosure of classified national security information or activities in publicly issued General Purpose Federal Financial Reports (GPFFRs). SFFAS 56 allows financial presentation and disclosure to accommodate user needs in a manner that does not impede national security. SFFAS 56 permits modifications that do not affect net results of operations or net position. In addition, SFFAS 56 allows a component reporting entity to be excluded from one reporting entity and consolidated into another reporting entity, and the effect of the modification may change the net results of operations and/or net position.

Interpretation 8 provides a decision chart illustrating the Board's intended implementation of the Interpretation. The Interpretation does not relieve reporting entities from their requirements and responsibilities to comply with other accounting standards in the appropriate classified environment as it relates to non-public records and reports. This illustration is non authoritative and depicts the process described in the Interpretation. Office of Management and Budget (OMB)

February 4, 2019—Administration Issues Annual Intellectual Property Report

The U.S. Intellectual Property Enforcement Coordinator (IPEC), Vishal Amin, issued the Administration's 2018 Annual Intellectual Property Report. The report lays out the Administration's four-part strategy to promote strong intellectual property protection and policy efforts, both domestically and abroad.

Governmental Accounting Standards Board (GASB)

May 02, 2019—GASB Establishes New Guidance to Assist Stakeholders with the Implementation and Application of Various GASB Pronouncements

The Governmental Accounting Standards Board (GASB) today issued question-and-answer guidance intended to clarify, explain, or elaborate on the implementation and application of certain GASB Statements.

<u>Implementation Guide No. 2019-1</u>, *Implementation Guidance Update–2019*, addresses new questions about application of the Board's standards on multiple topics, including but not limited to:

- Derivative instruments
- Disaster-related expenditure-driven grants
- Irrevocable split-interest agreements
- Postemployment benefits
- Tax abatement disclosures
- Transfers of capital assets within a financial reporting entity.

Implementation Guide 2019-1 also includes amendments to previously issued implementation guidance.

The requirements of Implementation Guide 2019-1 are effective for reporting periods beginning after June 15, 2019. Early application is encouraged for guidance related to standards that already have been implemented.

- Erica informed the board that on April 11th, membership is hosting a happy hour in Silver Spring. There will be food and drinks provided. As of today, there were 12 individuals who RSVP'd. This will be on the rooftop.
- Erica informed the board of the Spring Service event in Greenbelt on April 13.
- Erica informed the board of the crab feast scheduled for April 30.
- Erica asked to approve the board minutes from the March 2019 meeting. Freda motioned to approve and Holly seconded the motion. All were in favor.

DISCUSS & VOTE TO APPROVE ADMINISTRATIVE CHANGES
